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1 Peter 1:15a

13 Therefore, having girded up the loins of your mind, with sober-mindedness, set your hope fully on the grace to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ. 14 As obedient children, do not be conformed to the passions of your former ignorance. 15 But like the holy One who called you, be holy yourselves also in all your behavior; 16 because it is written: "You shall be holy, for I Am Holy." 17 And if you call upon the Father as the One who judges with impartiality according to each one's work, conduct yourselves with fear during your time of exile, 18 knowing that you have been redeemed

from your futile way of life inherited from your forefathers, not with perishable things like silver and gold, **19** but with the precious blood of Christ, like an unblemished and spotless lamb. **20** He was foreknown from before the foundation of the world, but He has appeared in these last times for your sake, **21** who through Him are believers in God, who raised Him from the dead and gave Him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.
