1 Peter 2:11

11 Beloved, I urge you as I urge you as aliens and strangers, to abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul. 12 Keep your behavior excellent among the pagans, so that in whatever they accuse you as evildoers, they may see your

good works and glorify God in the day of visitation.

Introduction

"We are to proclaim God's excellencies by protecting our passions while living with a pure purpose before the persecutions and problems of a pagan planet."

I. Proclaiming the Excellencies of God (vv. 11-12)

- A. Proclaiming God's Excellencies By Our Inward Devotion Preparation (11)
 - 1. **Rejoice** that you are loved (11a)
 - a. Agapētoi (ἀγαπητοι) plural Greek word for "beloved"
 - (1) NIV's "dear friends" misses the mark on two points:
 - b. The plight of Peter's audience . . .
 - c. Love is the purest motivator (why is our obedience connected to our love?)
 - 2. **Recognize** that you are a pilgrim (11b)
 - a. You are "aliens" and "strangers" on the earth

(2) "Stangers" = $parepid\bar{e}mos$ (παρεπιδημος)	
"These two words describe a temporary resident of a foreign land who has his eye on going"	
"We are sojourners, unable to live happily exiled from our fatherland. We seek for a way to help us to end our sorrows and to return to our native country." – Augustine	The word "pilgrim" comes from another word that literally means, "To settle down alongside of pagans.
