

"Armed for Suffering" (Part 7) The Error of Universalism

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1 Peter 4:6

1 Therefore, since Christ has suffered in the flesh, arm yourselves also with the same attitude, for he who has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin, 2 for as to live the rest of the time in the flesh no longer for the lusts of men but for the will of God. 3 For the time already past is sufficient [for you] to have carried out the desires of the pagans, while having pursued licentiousness, lusts, drunkenness, partying, drinking binges, and lawless idolatries. 4 In this they are ever surprised that you do not run with [them] into the same flood of debauchery, [and] they blaspheme [you].

5 But they will give an account to Him who is ready to judge the living and the dead. **6** [The Gospel] for this purpose has been preached even to the dead that although they are judged according to the flesh as men, they may live by the Spirit according to [the will of] God.

Introduction and Review ** Review of 3:18-20 - "Christ's Suffering and Our Salvation"

- A. Christ's Victory Came Through Suffering (3:18)

 - 1. Note that it says that He went and preached

 - b. Who are "the spirits in prison?"
 - (1) Angelic beings fall into two basic categories
 - (a) Holy elect angels (1 Tim. 2:4)
 - (b) Evil, fallen angels (demons)

- 2. What does it mean that "... they are judged according to the flesh as men ..."?
- 3. Saving faith in Christ doesn't mean we escape physical death It means we escape death!
- 4. Note that this "preaching" is something that occurred in the past
- 5. How were the adversaries maligning these first century believers?
- 6. Note the parallel to the Wisdom of Solomon and to 3:18

"But the souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them. In the eyes of the foolish they seemed to have died, and their departure was thought be a disaster, and their going from us to be their destruction; but they are at peace. For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality. Having been disciplined a little, they will receive great good, because God tested them and found them worthy of Himself; like the gold in the furnace He tried them, and like a sacrificial burnt offering He accepted them." [Wisdom of Solomon, 3:1-3]
